



- Are you 50-63 years old and have low to moderate risk factors for colorectal cancer?
- Are you 50-63 years old and never been screened for colorectal cancer?

Area residents have been chosen to participate in a colorectal cancer screening program for men and women age 50 to 63. The goal of the five-year program is to reduce the incidence, mortality and prevalence of colorectal cancer in Iowa by increasing the number of men and women who receive colorectal cancer screenings.

The program is funded through the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the Iowa Department of Public Health.

Who is eligible?

- Male and Female Iowa Residents
- Age 50 – 63 years;
- Uninsured;
- Underinsured:
- Insured, with no coverage for colorectal cancer screening;
- Insured but need assistance paying the co-pay or the deductible;
- People at Average or Increased Risk for colorectal cancer.

Average risk is defined as:

- No personal or family history of CRC or adenomas.
- No history of inflammatory bowel disease (ulcerative colitis or Crohn's disease).
- No history of genetic syndromes such as familial adenomatous polyposis (FAP) or hereditary non-polyposis colorectal cancer (HPNCC).
